# Update from the Chief

The council had its first general meeting with the community on September  $10^{\text{th}}$ . Thank you to those who turned out for the meeting; the members in attendance voted for the return of the original name of our community, "Kebaowek". In English it translates to "the Landing Place". So the official name of the community is Kebaowek First Nation.

It was also agreed that the streets be renamed after our community members who are veterans who served in the wars; as a way of acknowledging and honouring the sacrifice they made. We are currently gathering that information and preparing options for approval at the next community meeting. Once this is completed, this will allow us to have access to 911 services.

I also gave a presentation on our options for settling our land claims. We have a choice, we can either negotiate under the comprehensive claims policy, which will lead to the extinguishment of our rights, taxation and only getting a small amount of land and financial compensation, or we can go to court to prove aboriginal title which is proving that we never gave up our rights to the land and then negotiate a treaty which will ensure that we never have to extinguish our rights and that we get our traditional land base back.


To prove title we need to complete the gaps in our research and do current use and occupancy mapping to show that we are still using the land. This work will be completed this fall and will involve interviews with community members. We will be contacting the people and arranging for the interviews to be completed in November. The members in attendance agreed that going to court and proving title was the way to go and a mandate was given for us to prepare an aboriginal title case and prepare ourselves to go to court. This will take time and money to prepare so the council has created a legal defence fund where we will use the profits from fundraising to support the future court case.

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# Update from the Chief con't

We do not plan on doing this alone as we are trying to work with other Algonquin communities. In the mean time we will be opposing any developments that will lead to the extinguishment of our rights and title including mining and the development of Chaudiere Falls and Victoria Island in Ottawa. While I understand that people want to work and have an income, individual rights do not take priority over the collective rights of our members.

With the upcoming Federal Election, it is important to remember that the best way to make change happen is for all First Nations to vote, every vote counts. There are many issues that affect First Nations people, here and across Canada and I encourage every member of Kebaowek First Nation to vote in the Federal election on October 19th.

In closing, I want to wish all our hunters good luck and hope they are successful in getting meat to fill their freezers. If there are folks who are fortunate in getting a moose and have some meat to spare, please think about donating some to the food bank to share with members and elders who may not be able to get out and harvest their own meat.

## Land Management

The main priority of the Land Management (LM) department is to harmonize the future forestry operation and Identified sectors with the Tembec and the provincial government represented by the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR). As summer has come to a close we will start up our regular harmonization meetings here at the office with the MNR. Below is a list of the sectors that will be discussed with the MNR.

- **-Anderson Sector** is located a few kilometers north of Mattawa across the River on the Quebec side.
- **-Hamilton Sector** is located south of Garden Lake and East of Blue Lake.
- -Morgan/Sandeau Sector located next to Sandy Lake.
- **-Revolver Sector** is located south of Lake Du Fils.

On September 22, the MNR gave a presentation that was done by their biologist explaining the 'Ecosystemic Forest Management Plan' here at the Band Office boardroom.

The Rexforet brush cutting training was completed by September 25. Congratulations going out to the successful candidates: Corey Davidson, Dominic Lariviere, Devin Mitchell and Tyler Young-Polson.

As was mentioned by Chief Lance Haymond at the Band meeting on September  $10^{th}$ , it is important that Band Members come in to the Kebaowek Land Management to let us know where they are using the land for hunting, fishing and trapping so that we can build up a data base. The LM Office invites all members and is looking forward to seeing them drop by with their comments and/or concerns on the sectors that are up for discussion at the MNR.

## Fire Department

#### Fire Prevention Week

In 2014, Fire Prevention Week was held from 5 till 11 October. It is the full week of October that includes the 9 of the month that is retained for the event. You want to know why? Keep on reading...

#### **History**

Why is there a fire prevention week? Why is it held at the beginning of October each year? A brief story...


It is October 9, 1871, in Chicago. A major fire is raging. It is brought under control only 27 hours later, leaving only ruin and devastation in its wake. More than 250 people lost their lives/died and 100,000 others were left homeless. The fire destroyed more than 17,400 buildings and ravaged over 4,800 hectares of land.

It was forty years later, in 1911, that the oldest member organization of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the Fire Marshals Association of North America, organized the first fire prevention day to commemorate the great Chicago fire. The event grew to such proportions that 11 years later, the first Fire Prevention Week was launched in the United States.


In Canada, it was Ontario that held the first provincial Fire Prevention Day, in 1916. The first national Fire Prevention Day was held in 1919. The Governor General of Canada proclaimed the first Fire Prevention Week in Canada in 1923. And the Ministère de la Sécurité publique du Québec has held a Fire Prevention Week since 1990.

Why commemorate the date of a fire that occurred in the United States? It seemed only logical for the two countries to pool their efforts to highlight the event on the same date. Thus, Fire Prevention Week has always been held in the first full week of October in the United States as well as in Canada.





# Research on fisher and American marten 2015-2017



Hello, Kwe,

During the autumn 2015, a research project on fisher and American marten will take place in the Témiscamingue region. This project is conducted by the Université du Québec en Abitibi-Témiscamingue in collaboration with the Ministry of Forests, Wildlife and Parks. The project will take place between autumn 2015 and spring 2017. Fisher capture is scheduled between mid-October and mid-December, during the trapping season.

Several fishers and martens will be captured and fitted with an identification microchip. Some fishers will be equipped with a radio collar. For this purpose, live capture cages will be placed near the main road between Notre-Dame-du-Nord and Deux-Rivières. Habitats selected by fishers will be identified by telemetry, and their movements in relation to forest management will also be monitored. We would be grateful if you would not get close to capture installations you might find. You might capture a fisher equipped with a radio collar. We solicit your cooperation and ask you to communicate with the people mentioned below, so we can retrieve the collars and their valuable information. To remove the collar from the neck of an animal, we ask that you loosen the clamp bolt instead of cutting the belt with a knife, rendering it useless. The Université du Québec en Abitibi-Témiscamingue will give \$ 20 (+ delivery cost) to the trappers who will return a collar, and a map showing the movements of the fisher before its capture.

Your cooperation is essential, and it is very important that any observation of fishers be forwarded us. If you observe, photograph (with a hunting camera, for example) or capture a fisher with a radio collar, please contact the following persons:
